Back to Andamooka



NOSTALGIA...Former Andamooka residents Rick Boston and Maya Kelleway took a close look at more than 70 years of local history during the opal town's Easter celebrations this month. The pair, who now reside in Warooka on the Yorke Peninsula, lived in Andamooka for more than 10 years and still own a home locally. They visit Andamooka at least once a year, usually for the 'Back to Andamooka' reunion celebrations each Easter.

ANDAMOOKA...More than 300 former Andamooka residents and visiting tourists celebrated Easter in the outback opal mining town in 2005, the community's 75th year.

Around 200 people attended the annual APOMA Cottages community barbecue on Good Friday, followed by another 70 or so who enjoyed the Reunion Ball on Saturday night.

On Sunday the community visited White Dam for the 'Back to Bill's' RFDS fundraiser.

For many of the returnees, the weekend was an opportunity to catch up with old friends and peruse through piles of photographs and other nostalgia.

In fact, one of the highlights of the wee end was the Andamooka history project started by former local resident and teacher Anne Pitt with documents and photographs dating back to the 1930s.

But, few of the visitors flicking through the piles of photographs, certificates and newspaper clippings were aware of just how close the community has come to losing the collection.

In fact, the bulk of the collection was destroyed in one of three fires at the Andamooka Primary School since the early 1990s.

Then in 2004 the collection was condemned when the most recent fire raised concerns the collection had been contaminated by asbestos.

To save the collection, the Andamooka community applied to the SA Government for an exemption and, after rigorous testing, it was returned to APOMA.

Since then, local resident and police officer Nigel Campbell has begun transferring the original documents and photographs to computer.

Officer Campbell took on the history project after Ms Pitt's eyesight began to fail.

"There's some amazing stuff – photographs, wedding certificates and newspaper clippings, books and poems and even videos," officer Campbell told The Monitor.

"We have a whole lot of information about Minnie Berrington – Andamooka's first female miner in the 1930s.

"She moved to Andamooka from Coober Pedy and ran the post office, she was in the army and a police officer too when there were only 12 or 14 female officers in the whole state.

"There's so much here but we want more." Officer Campbell, and his fellow history buffs, are calling for former and present Andamooka residents to contribute their own photographs and records to the

"We want everything to do with Andamooka," he said.

"We are slowly building up a good history of the town for the future – we've already got photographs of three and four generations of local families."

In the 12 years I've been working on newspapers I've written too many obituaries, knocked on the door of too many bereaved families and reported too many disasters. I've had to write about murders, shipwrecks, drug overdoses, a balloon crash, plane crashes and, of course, car collisions. This month, I've had to write about the loss of Colin Wilson and his three-year-old son Adam—and to Frankie, Samuel, Matthew and Hannah, we at *The Monitor* send our sincerest sympathies. Nothing we could ever write in these pages could possibly lessen your loss or your sadness—but that sadness is shared.

Newspapers like ours, in small towns, walk a very fine line between what we should and should not print when a member of our close-knit community dies. A solid, factual news report about a community death can do a lot of good things. It can quell rumour, it can offer a community warning, it can provide information to those friends and acquaintances who don't feel free to approach a mourning family — maybe even taking some of the pressure off a family who needs time to get away from questions.

On the other hand, an obituary can be a celebration of a lost friend or family member, a tribute to their life and a final message from the people they loved. But you'll notice *The Monitor* does not always print an obituary when a local person dies. Our local team is very strict on only printing information provided by family members and close friends.

Any factual information about an accident, especially one resulting in a death, is sourced through official avenues such as police. Some photographs are also deemed inappropriate or sensational. Not only are our choices defined by the ethics surrounding our industry, but also the sensibilities of our readers. Juicy gossip is not news. Wallowing self-promotion is not news. Grisly details of a death are not news. We do not report suicides and we do not interfere with ongoing police investigations. As a newspaper, we do not feel it is in the community's benefit for us to do otherwise.

So sometimes, when you read *The Monitor*, and you know there's more to a story – you can take some comfort in knowing that we, as a community newspaper, are only willing to publish correct and community-relevant information.

As always, let me end with my little message for the day. Court is on in Roxby Downs this week, and once again I will sit down to hear about the dozens and dozens of local drivers picked up for drink driving, driving without seatbelts or speeding. Some of them are just kids and a whole lot of them are grown adults who should know better. If you don't know better, please...learn fast. I don't want to write any more obituaries for a while.

\$345,000 redesign for **Rocket Range Museum**

WOOMERA...Woomera residents celebrated the official opening of the \$345,000 Rocket Range Museum last week.

After more than 18 months in construction, the museum was officially opened by Tourism Minister Jane Lomax-Smith and Woomera Area Administrator Garry Clarke.

The upgrade was jointly funded by the SA Government, BAE Systems and the Woomera Board, giving the centre – which attracts 12,000 visitors per year - a state-of-the-art revamp with multi-media components.

"Through this redevelopment it has been transformed from an open room cluttered with objects to a world-class display," Mr Clarke told *The Monitor*.

"Today's opening means a lot to the community of Woomera and we expect the museum to greatly benefit the township as a tourism attraction.'

Tourism Minister Jane Lomax-Smith congratulated the Woomera community's for its ongoing stewardship of the township's history.

"I personally feel very strongly about this exhibition," Ms Lomax-Smith said.

"For ordinary people, the display was never very inviting, but now, walking through the museum, I find the images very evocative of another time.

"It's a very exciting new display and it's going to drag more people into Woomera which I can see becoming a big tourism centre.

"It will also mean opportunities within tourism and hospitality for local youth, as well as defence and

Project designer Bev Hocking told *The Monitor* how the original collection – featuring everything from fossils to rockets – had been filtered down to leave a clear, chronological 'story'. Museum visitors can now walk through an interactive display, dedicated to the history of SA's own 'space base', before perusing the 'social history room' which focuses on facets of Woomera's community life.

The museum upgrade is part of a series of tourism revamps state-wide this month. Other highlights of the \$2.5million outback tourism upgrade announced

Port Augusta - \$1 million upgrade of the Australian Arid Lands Botanic Garden and \$400,000 redevelopment of the Wadlata Outback Centre.

Iga Warta - \$500,000 upgrade of the Iga Warta Aboriginal tourism operation.

Coober Pedy - \$230,000 redeveopment of the Coober Pedy Visitor Information Centre.

Marree - \$640,000 town precinct development at Marree in cooperation with the Federal Government and WMC Resources.

William Creek - \$200,000 redevelopment of the William Creek Racecourse, a joint project with the William Creek Progress Association.

Oodnadatta - \$145,000 redevelopment of the Oodnadatta Business and Cultural Centre and \$300,000 upgrade of the Oodnadatta Racecourse.

Outback - \$200,000 for interpretation and heritage projects along the Oodnadatta, Birdsville and Strzelecki Tracks including restoration work at the ghost town of Farina.

"This is a defining moment in the development of Roxby Downs com-munity," community plan coordinator Ray Goldie told *The Monitor*.


"The plan is innovative in many ways – from the community management structure it proposes for Roxby Downs to the high degree of community participation in its design."

Over the past four months the "Our Service Your Heritage" reference group, which comprises local veterans from WW2, Vietnam, ex service men, Army Cadets, police and interested community members, have been working hard to gather important items for the exhibition that have significance for Port Augusta and surrounding communities.







While most of us are aware of the damage that ultraviolet light can do to the skin, medical evidence shows that our eyes can also be harmed. Long-term exposure to UV can lead to cataracts and

macular degeneration (leading causes of blindness). cancer and pterygium (a fleshy growth on the cornea).

Even short-term exposure can lead to significant pain, irritation and sensitivity to

The key to protection from harmful UV light is to avoid longer-term exposure that can slowly and painlessly impair vision.

Protection should start with very young children and become part of their routine. The human eye is not fully developed until the age of 30 years and early UV exposure can be the most damaging in the longer-term.

There are some key hints to avoid the effects of UV radiation:

Avoid the sun... In summer, three-quarters of UV exposure occurs between 10 am and 4 pm. Staying out of the sun as much as possible between those times will reduce your UV exposure. Wear a hat... If you do venture outdoors, a broadbrimmed hat will protect your head from sunburn and reduce by half the amount of UV reaching your eyes. Wear eye protection... Sunglasses that meet Australian standards and photochromic lenses, which go dark in the sun then become clear again, will reduce the amount of UV reaching your eyes.

The winter sports season is almost upon us, and now is a good time to discuss the management of acute sports related injuries.

"Whether it is a sprained finger, a corked thigh or a blown out knee, the early management of any injury has a large influence on the speed of recovery and return to your preferred sporting activity," physiotherapist Scott Humphries from the Roxby Downs Rehabilitation Centre told The Moni-

"The principles of R.I.C.E in the first 24-48 hours after injury, can minimise the extent of bleeding and inflammation following any tissue injury."

In practical terms, R.I.C.E involves;

REST...stop exercise as soon as possible and restrict movement of the injured limb over the next 24-36 hours. If the injury is to a lower limb and weight bearing is painful, crutches may be of assistance until weight bearing

ICE...Apply ice to the injury for 20 minutes every hour for the first 6 hours then 20 minutes every 2 hours for the next 18 hours.

COMPRESSION...A compression bandage should be applied to reduce tissue swelling. It should be applied in between icing sessions and also while sleeping.

ELEVATION...Elevatethe injured limb above the level of the heart if possible. Use pillows to elevate the limb when sleeping.

"R.I.C.E should be followed for the 1st 24-48 hours after injury. However, it the injury is severe, R.I.C.E may be continued for 3-5 days, especially if the injured area remains red, hot and swollen," Mr Humphries said.

"While the injured athlete is following the principles of R.I.C.E, they should also avoid the principles of H.A.R.M."

Avoid the following;

HEAT...While heat may relieve pain at the injured site, it also will increase internal bleeding in the damaged tissue.

ALCOHOL...Alcohol dilates blood vessels, which bleeding to the injured site. RUNNING...Or any activity that may cause further tissue damage.

MASSAGE...Increases blood flow and tissue dam-

When to seek medical ad-

"A good rule of thumb is to be guided by the person's loss of normal function at the injured site," Mr Humphries said.

"For example if the patient is unable to bear weight on an injured leg, or move the injured neck, back, hand, shoulder etc through at least 50 per cent of the normal range of motion, then the patient should contact their Physiotherapist or Medical Practitioner."


Due to the heat this game had to be moved from the afternoon to the evening, and the players certainly appreciated not sweltering in the 42°C temperatures.


But the Moliks fought back with Roger Scholefield abd Scott Fraser in fine form winning, comfortably winning the first doubles and their singles matches.


