Call for smaller classes OSHC closure forestalled

ROXBY DOWNS...Roxby Downs Area School students spent Tuesday at home this week, while local teachers spent the day lobbying to ensure low class sizes at the school.

While teachers across the nation striked on Tuesday for a range of issues, including pay rises, local Australian Education Union spokesmen stressed that, in Roxby Downs, teachers were focussed on safeguarding low class sizes at RDAS.

"Educators from Roxby Downs Area School, the Roxby Downs Kindergarten and TAFE have taken industrial action this week to defend the right of every Australian child to have local access to the highest quality education our state can offer," according to local AEU spokesmen Ben Summerton and Michael Wyskamp.

"We believe we need to improve the quality and quantity of attention paid to the individual learning needs of our students as well as attracting and retaining high quality teachers.

"This requires a funding commitment that includes parity of pay for all our educators, which in turn impacts parity of learning.

The Australian Education Union has negotiated in good faith with the State Government since November 2004 on behalf of concerned educators who want to continue to improve the standard of education in our public schools.

"The outcomes of this enterprise bargaining will have a direct impact on the quality of education we can offer in Roxby Downs ranging from Kindergarten to Roxby Downs Area School and to TAFE.'

In Roxby Downs, this negotiation will centre around a cap on class sizes.

"We have no safeguard against class sizes exploding, especially with the expansion ahead of us - currently we have some relatively-low class numbers,' Mr Summerton told *The Monitor*.

Mr Summerton said pay rises would also ensure quality teachers in Roxby Downs which, with capped class sizes and the resulting effects on studentteacher interaction, would ensure more local students would continue their studies in Roxby Downs through to their senior years.

The AEU has invited local community members to join the call for higher wages, caps on class sizes and better learning conditions for local students.

"If you as a parent or community member share similar concerns for education in Roxby Downs and South Australia, contact your local MP and encourage change for the future.

Investing in our children's future is the greatest investment a society can make," Mr Summerton and Mr Wyskamp said. "We acknowledge that a number of parents may have been temporarily inconvenienced by the industrial action.

"We believe, however, that the action taken by the majority of our educators is in the best long term interests of our students and community who deserve the best opportunities our state can offer, particularly during economically prosperous times.'

ROXBY DOWNS...Local teachers have thrown their support behind the Roxby Downs Out of School Hours Care, forestalling the closure of the service this month when director Nicki Morgan leaves Roxby Downs to have her twin babies.

Despite ongoing advertising, the director's position remains unfilled, leaving more than 20 families without care in the upcoming school holidays - until two local teachers decided to take up the challenge.

While not a permanent solution, the move ensures that OSCH doors will remain open for the July vacation care program.

OSHC is Roxby Downs' only vacation care program independent of local child care centres.

"These are school-aged children and they don't want to be in child care, their families don't want them in child care – they want to stay where they are," Ms Morgan told *The Monitor*.

"Our service opens at 6.30 in the morning and its very important to working families – we have kids here who come daily.

"Parents are very concerned - they don't know what they're going to do."

Roxby Downs Area School spokesman Carol Lindner said OSHC organisers are still seeking a full-time coordinator for 12 months.

"It's fantastic that our local teachers have stepped up to keep the program open.

"We're still looking for a permanent person but right now we're just focusing on keeping the vacation program running over the holidays.

"It's very important we continue this local service because OSHC contributes to these children's education and is a very important part of their early learning."



Hi there, welcome to Roxby Downs!

This is where I grew up. I went to school here, and now my children do too. I bought my first car here, my first home, met my husband, and my next door neighbour was my midwife when my first child was born.

But that's just me. What makes this town special for you? What makes it home? And how can you make it feel like home for someone else?

I've been people-watching in Roxby Downs for a lot of years now and I'm always interested in what makes the difference between the 'lifers' and the 'short-timers'. And I think the answer is, simply, 'involvement'.

Some people find it easy to get involved in the community - they join sports, seek out networks and make friends. Others need to be 'wooed' to call Roxby Downs home. And, if those of us who love the town want it to be known as a 'welcoming' community - are we ready to extend that invitation?

So that's my challenge to the Roxby Downs 'lifers' - let's welcome new residents to our town and maybe, in turn, they'll invite other new residents into the community. All it takes is a smile or a knock on a new neighbour's door. New residents, potential residents – it's up to you to run with it when someone throws you the ball. If you have small children, if you're a shift worker or maybe, you're just a little shy, don't let yourself get stuck in your own four walls.

And it's not just individuals we need to welcome into our community. There's always been a long-running perception of 'them and us' in Roxby Downs – the 'contractors' and the 'brown shirts' as we used to call WMC staff.

I see it when people chat about local crime – they want to blame 'the contractors'. But, more than 40 per cent of our community comprises long-term contractors at Olympic Dam and 'they' have become part of the 'us'.

How many more of our contractors could we 'invite' to join our community? What do we really do for these single men and women, or commuting partners, to 'woo' them into Roxby Downs?

Would our drink-driving and assault rates be so high during the next expansion – as they were in the last one – if we invited those 'short-termers' to leave the Camp environment behind and join the wider community?

What would they choose if we offered them the chance to join local sports, meet local families and, maybe, just enjoy a friendly barbecue in someone's back yard instead of hanging off the end of a bar?

Renewed accreditation for local health services

ROXBY DOWNS AND WOOMERA...The combined Roxby Downs Health Services and Woomera Hospital are celebrating their renewed accreditation from the Australian Council of Health Care Standards.

After achieving their initial accreditation in 2003, the local health teams have once again improved local services to achieve the newest stamp of approval.

"Since our initial accreditation, the requirements have been made a lot more stringent and the standard required was substantially higher," Roxby Downs Health Services executive officer Janine Connell told The Monitor.

"We were surveyed by two experts in the health industry who looked at every aspect of the services.

"We were very pleased to achieve ongoing accreditation.

"For the communities of Roxby Downs and Woomera, this is recognition that the health services are providing a quality service and that has been highlighted by an external organisation that assesses us against industry standards."

Mrs Connell thanked local health staff and, in particular, quality coordinator Linda King for their involvement in gaining the accreditation.

"Linda was instrumental in ensuring that the whole thing came together," Mrs Connell said.

"Across the board, it's been a huge effort on behalf of all the staff.


"This accreditation process is, very much, an ongoing quality improvement process.

"The Roxby Downs Health Services and Woomera Community Hospital are both committed to continued improvement in our services to the local community."

Almost 50 staff, including 35 nursing staff, are employed by both services in Roxby Downs and Woomera.

Police report a quiet fortnight



ROXBY DOWNS... The past week has been quiet as far as reported and detected crime within Roxby Downs, according to local police services.

The theft of two nail guns valued at about \$800 each

was reported by a local building contractor on May 26, 2005. The theft is believed to have occurred from a storeroom in the light industrial area sometime in the past two months.

A resident of Wattle Drive disturbed an unknown person in the rear yard of their house late at night on May 23, 2005. This person decamped as soon as they were disturbed.

Police are concerned about recent reports of overnight thefts from clothes lines and other reports of suspicious activity around town at night. If anyone has any similar incidents they are urged to immediately report them to Police to allow an accurate picture of the situation to be gained.

The Roxby Downs Police have received many enquiries about the influx of police vehicles and new faces in uniform about town early in the week.

"Fortunately it is nothing to be alarmed about," a police spokesman told *The Monitor*:

"Most were in town as part of the regular training program conducted by SAPol to ensure that our staff are operating to the best standards of knowledge and skills when it comes to completing their duties.

"In addition there were officers in town visiting Olympic Dam for emergency planning and others who are working in the Woomera area as part of a national project.

Tidy Towns advice for local communities

FAR NORTH...Longrunning KESAB Tidy Towns judge Ross Swayne visited the Far North region last week.

Mr Swayne has been visiting Roxby Downs and the surrounding region since the late 1980s and has watched the township grow and change over more than 20 years.

While Mr Swayne cited some improvements in the community's presentation since the 2004 judging - such as "very impressive" landscaping and upgrades at Camp 3 - he told The Monitor that Roxby Downs seemed to be at a turning point.

"There's a real feeling of 'just wait and see' with so many projects on hold at the moment," he said.

"The town is waiting, finding out where it is going to go once BHP Billiton's plans are better known.

While Mr Swayne praised Roxby Downs Council's plans for future refurbishments, he

his own for the community.

The Tidy Towns judge of 28 years called for a more welcoming entrance to the township, directing visitors into the town's centre and integrated plantings throughout the southern expansion areas.

"When you visit the






"When we've completed the new paving, shade structures and put in the new computers the planned upgrades will total close to \$300,000. "We're still fundraising for new playground equipment."

"So far more than 155 members of the Roxby Downs Community have participated in the consultations including representatives from a variety of stakeholder groups.'

Some of the key participants in the process so far include local school students, youth services management and participants, TAFE students and young adults, SA Police, teachers and educators, health professionals, spiritual and

health counsellors, the business community, Andamooka residents and local sporting clubs.

"People who participated in the consultations have been open and frank, and have described the many issues that relate to young people, not only from the viewpoint of the adult community, but also from the perspective of young people themselves," Mr Wade said.

"Identifying symptoms of the problem that the town faces has been the easy part.

"The next phase of the process is to decide on appropriate solutions that can be incorporated into a three-year youth development plan from which the community can secure support for the implementation of key youth development projects.

"It will also feed into the Roxby Downs Family and Youth Forum to assist that group in achieving its objectives

"Fortunately, many of the participants, particularly young people, have identified innovative and imaginative potential solutions that will be incorporated into a discussion paper to be released in coming weeks."

A workshop will be convened early in August to take the project to the next stage, and will call on the ideas, experiences and talents of people from all of the stakeholder

The plan's development is being overseen by a Steering Committee comprising Bec Penglase (Roxby Downs Youth Services), Ben Garwood (WMC), Tom Beever (Roxby Downs Christian Community Church), Laurence Duggan (Roxby Downs Cultural Precinct) and Bill Boehm (Roxby Downs Council).

Attendance matters

In March the school implemented two attendancemonitoring programs. One was the MsgU program which generates SMS messages to inform parents that their child(ren) have not turned up at school.

The second program, VIP Tone, is for students arriving late to school and it allows them to swipe an ID card.

The first program is generating text messages and some parents are responding to these promptly. Other parents are choosing not to respond which is fine provided students have notes to explain the absence.

The VIPTone swipe card program has been less successful. This program generates a docket to be signed by parents. The docket also has a 'reason for lateness section'.

In most instances students code in 'unexplained' as the reason, particularly if they have got up late for school. Parents who sign this docket have the option to sign as is or change the code and sign. To assist with this process, students will collect a code sheet with the docket.

Checking the effectiveness of this system, it is disappointing to note that at many year levels student behaviour has not changed and dockets are not being returned with parent signatures, and notes of explanation for absence are not being provided.

Students with excessive numbers of unexplained absences are at risk of not successfully completing their work and schools are required, after instituting reasonable follow up processes, to inform Attendance Officers.

In the School Camps and Excursions section, in the Principal's report, mention was made of Exemptions and what constitutes a valid reason to request an exemption from school. The Education Act and the guidelines that relate to the Act are quite specific. Parents may request an exemption for up to one month from the Principal; for more than one month the request needs to go to DECS Director of Schools.

When requesting an exemption, parents/carers are asked to "provide evidence of the relevant community group's perception of the extent of the child's obligations." In plain English this has been commonly understood to mean that some communities will support absence for reasons that will not satisfy other communities.

In Roxby Downs there is often a need for travel and residence for short period of time in other places to access legal, medical, surgical and other facilities for the student or family. These are the most common requests for exemptions. The family annual holiday, where parents/carers leave does not neatly coincide with school breaks, may be another valid reason.

Making decisions about the worth of a school program does not entitle parents to keep students home so requesting exemptions from school during a camp or other excursion is not appropriate and cannot be granted.

The Administrative Guidelines for schools (based on the Education Act) defines unsatisfactory attendance as follows:

"ailure by a student to regularly attend school during agreed times or participate in a meaningful manner in his or her planned education program."

Under this definition, students taking time off on a regular basis for three or four days may well be deemed unsatisfactory. Certainly, absence of this type with no explanation from a parent/carer would constitute unsatisfactory attendance.

Schools and DECS sites are required to follow up unsatisfactory attendance and, if not satisfied, must inform the department's Attendance Unit.

From the Administrative Guidelines: "It should be noted that the Education Act 1972 provides for prosecution of parents/caregivers/guardian in certain circumstances for students who fail to attend at school. Individual circumstances will determine whether a prosecution will be considered under the Education Act." Like most schools we are sympathetic to the needs of families whilst protecting young people's right to a consistent education.

If there is a need for your child to be absent regularly, or for a prolonged period of time, please contact us for clarification about the processes to follow.



Is your agent accredited?

VIA...The National Institute of Accountants (NIA) has issued a warning to all those seeking to use a tax agent to ensure the person is a registered tax agent and a member of a professional accounting

"The NIA is concerned at the increasing number of complaints about people claiming to be a tax agent, charging a fee to do the tax return and then not lodging - only for the poor taxpayer to discover the person is neither a registered tax agent nor a member of a professional accounting body," Reece Agland, the NIA's technical counsel, told *The Monitor*.

"The law clearly sets out that only a registered tax agent or a Solicitor can prepare, lodge and charge to do a tax return. It is important for taxpayers if they are using for the first time a person who claims to be tax agent to ensure that the person is in fact registered with the Tax Agents Board (TAB) and is also a member of a professional accounting body.'

Ask your tax agent to show proof they are a registered tax agent; log onto the TAB website at www.tabd.gov.au and do a search on the person or their company to see if they are registered or ring the TAB on 1300 362 829.



Andamooka pipeline included in plan for Regional SA

Andamooka is among the Far North and Outback communities that will benefit directly and indirectly from a range of projects included in the Rann Government's South Australia Strategic Infrastructure Plan

The Government recently released its Regional Overview including the deepening of the Outer Harbour shipping channel, the Port River road and rail bridges and a new underpass and tunnel for South Road, all of which will greatly improve the efficiency of the state's freight transport network ultimately benefiting regional export industries.

One major infrastructure project announced across the region is the construction of a pipeline to transport water from Roxby Downs to Andamooka.

The State Government has allocated \$500,000 for the project, with work to be undertaken in cooperation with the Outback Areas Trust and the Andamooka Progress Association.

Funds for the pipleine were made available

following strong lobbying from the Andamooka community and local MP Lyn Breuer.

In major infrastructure projects already under way, \$48 million is being spent on upgrading schools over 2004/05 to 2006/07 and includes Amata Anangu and Fregon Anangu schools.

The Regional Overview Plan provides a framework for infrastructure development over the next five and 10 years throughout the State and is based on close consultation with Regional Development Boards and local government.

The ultimate goal of the Plan is to stimulate economic growth in regional South Australia through commitment to ongoing infrastructure investment in areas that will benefit the whole State.

"The Rann Government is serious about addressing the infrastructure needs of regional South Australia in order to give all South Australians the quality of life they deserve," Minister for Infrastructure Patrick Conlon

Support for country doctors

A major \$27.2 million package of initiatives to improve working and living conditions for doctors in the Outback and country areas was handed down in the State Government's budget.

Key features of the four-year package include:

*Increased on-call and other allowances

Improved locum (relief) services for overworked doctors, and

 Increased further development and training support for country GPs and specialists, and scholarships for country students, as well as country-based hospital internships.

The 2005-06 Budget for Country Health is \$372 million, up by \$44 million, or 13.4%, from the 2004-05 Budget.

Other features of the budget include:

 \$4.1 million over four years for the Royal Flying Doctor Service base at Port Augusta to ensure the continued provision of aero-medical services to the northern areas of the State.

 \$1.1 million over four years for implementation of the Outback Areas Community Development Trust Strategic Plan.

 \$17.9 million for a range of projects to upgrade facilities at schools including, Ernabella Anangu School and Pipalyatjara Anangu School

 \$1.7 million over four years for the continuation of a range of skills development programs on the APY Lands.

 \$5.7 million for centralised solar and diesel power station and distribution system in the APY lands.

\$2.5m Outback tourism revamp

Woomera, Coober Pedy and Oodnadatta are among the Outback communities set to reap the economic benefits of millions of dollars worth of tourism redevelopments.

The State Government has provided \$2.5 million in recent grants to develop tourism across the Outback, and now many of the exciting new facilities built with that money have opened.

"The Outhack and Flinders Ranges are enormously popular with tourists, attracting on average 680,000 people a year — more visitors than any other South Australian region except Adelaide," Tourism Minister Jane Lomax-Smith said. Among the projects are:

 A \$230,000 redevelopment of the Coober Pedy Information Centre;

*\$345,000 upgrade of the Woomera Haritage Centre which is a joint project with the Federal Government, BAE Systems and the Woomera Board, with the State Government contributing \$145,000.

•\$145,000 redevelopment of the Oodnadatta Business and Cultural Centre

 \$300,000 redevelopment of the Oodnadarta Racecourse, a joint project with the Federal Government and the Oodnadarta Race Club with the State Government contributing \$148,000;

 \$300,000 town sewerage upgrade at Parachilna to cope with increase in visitor numbers;

•\$640,000 town precinct development at Marree, a joint project with the Federal Government and Western Mining. The State Government contributed \$280,000;

•\$200,000 redevelopment of facilities at the William Creek Raeccourse, a joint project with the William Creek Progress Association. The State Government, through the SA Tourism Commission and the Outback Areas Community Development Trust, contributed \$130,000;

+\$500,000 upgrade of Iga Warta:

•\$200,000 Interpretation and Heritage Projects involved several projects to interpret and conserve significant heritage sites along the Oodnadatta, Birdsville and Strzelecki Tracks and included restoration work at the ghost town, Farina.

Mineral Exploration hits 18-year high

South Australia has recorded its highest level of mineral exploration for more than 18 years.

Premier Mike Rann welcomed the latest Australian Bureau of Statistics figures showing exploration in South Australia was worth \$55:5 million last year (2004).

"Our Government has been working hard to attract more private investment and this is a good sign of things to come," Premier Rann said.

"We've set ambitious targets in the State Strategic Plan and we've affocated \$22.5 million over five years to belp bring investment in mining exploration to \$100 million by 2007, boost annual minerals production to \$3 million by 2020 with a further \$1 billion in minerals processing.

"The latest results are a good first step, delivering a 55% increase on 2003 figures when \$39.5 million was invested in mineral exploration.

"South Australia now has 6% of the national exploration expenditure – again, our best figure for more than 18 years. In 2003 South Australia's share was 4.9%."

Mr Rann said the State Government's Plan for ACcelerating Exploration (PACE) is contributing to the exploration boom, with the State Government paying up to half the cost of selected drilling programs.

Coober Pedy miners increase PACE

The Rann Government has now provided \$100,000 under the Plan for Accelerating Exploration (PACE) scheme to assist further opal exploration at Coober Pedy.

An initial grant of \$50,000 was made last June, and Minerals and Resources Development Minister Paul Holloway says a further \$50,000 grant has now been made with the money used to buy a drilling rig, which will further develop the opal mining industry in and around the town.

"Under the terms of the agreement, local opal miners will conduct a drilling program in conjunction with PIRSA geologists, who will record and report on the results of the drilling," Mr Holloway said.

"This recognises that a long term program is needed to expand the existing opal field – notwithstanding recent promising discoveries at Allan Rise."

Mr Holloway said the drilling program will involve exploratory drilling in areas away from known opal producing fields, with the aim of locating new areas of precious opal in the Coober Pedy Precious Stones Field.

Despite 90 years of opal mining, large areas of the Precious Stones Field remain unexplored.

Drillhole locations will be chosen by either participating miners or PIRSA geologists, with the results to be made publicly available as soon as possible after drilling is completed.

Basketball to go indoors at Coober Pedy

A \$200,000 grant from the State Government's Community Recreation and Sport Facilities Grant Program will see Coober Pedy's existing basketball court converted into an index facility.

The joint project with Umoona Community Council will include resurfacing, eladding and electrical work to maximise the use of the existing court in all weather. The conversion to an indoor basketball court is one of 25 projects to share \$1.5 million in funding




